A Word from our Pastor

They're called "earworms." We all get one from time to time. "Earworm" is the term used to describe the phenomenon of having a song playing repetitively in your mind. The scientific term is Involuntary Musical Imagery (IMI), but it's just a fancy way of describing song-stuck syndrome. Most of us can relate to having "earworms" of a religious variety: hymns, choral arrangements, and songs we learned at youth camp. On and on they play... and I find it's easier to just sing along to whatever song that only I can hear playing.

My most recent "earworm" was "How Can I Keep From Singing?" which Amanda sang several weeks ago as a solo. The melody has been cycling ever since, but ironically, the words are not familiar to me. A Lutheran pastor-friend obliged me with a copy of the hymn (by a different title) from his church's hymnal, and the words struck me as a great testimony of one's fervent faith.

My life flows on in endless song;
above earth's lamentation,
I catch the sweet, though far-off hymn
that hails a new creation.

No storm can shake my inmost calm
while to that Rock I'm clinging.
Since Love is lord of heav'n and earth,

May we choose to continue singing the song of hope, trusting the One whose love for us is sure and eternal.
